## JANUARY 2026 WEATHER FORECAST

### LABRADOR, NEWFOUNDLAND

**1st–3rd:** Blustery start to the year. Coastal Newfoundland sees strong winds and snow; inland Labrador faces frigid air and drifting snow. **4th–7th:** Overcast and windy in western Newfoundland and mountains. Central Labrador experiences light flurries and colder, drier air by the 6th. **8th–11th:** Brief calm in southern Newfoundland. A winter storm develops over northern Labrador, bringing heavy snow and strong winds inland. **12th–15th:** Moderating temperatures along the coast. Western areas may see some snow squalls. **16th–19th:** A deep freeze settles in. Most areas will be dry but very cold. **20th–23rd:** Wet, cool air moves into southern Newfoundland. Labrador's interior sees intensifying snow showers, especially around the 22nd–23rd. **24th–27th:** Very unsettled; showery/windy weather. **28th–31st:** A nor'easter brings heavy snow and winds to eastern Newfoundland. Labrador's coast faces blizzard conditions, followed by clearing skies and a sharp freeze.

### NOVA SCOTIA, PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND, NEW BRUNSWICK, QUEBEC

**1st–3rd:** The New Year begins with snowstorms and blustery winds across the Maritimes and eastern Quebec. **4th–7th:** Cold, dry air dominates. northern New Brunswick and central Quebec face frigid winds, while southern Nova Scotia sees overcast skies and occasional flurries. **8th–11th:** Fair skies before a strong system brings heavy snow and gusty winds to eastern Quebec, northern New Brunswick, and western Prince Edward Island. **12th–15th:** Mild air reaches southern Nova Scotia. Interior Quebec turns sharply colder with blowing snow. **16th–19th:** A deep freeze settles in throughout the region. northern Quebec and the Laurentians face extreme cold. **20th–23rd:** Wet and cool for New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. Eastern Quebec sees snow squalls. **24th–27th:** A clipper system delivers wind-driven snow to western New Brunswick and central PEI, followed by a brief thaw. **28th–31st:** A powerful nor'easter slams the Atlantic coast with heavy snow. Quebec braces for blizzard conditions and a sharp cold snap.

### ONTARIO

**1st–3rd:** Ontario rings in the New Year under a wintry veil. Southern Ontario sees gusty winds and lake-effect snow. A notable snowstorm is likely to develop by the 3rd. **4th–7th:** Bitter cold for northern Ontario. Overcast, light flurries eastern Ontario. **8th–11th:** Fair skies southwestern Ontario, but by the 10th, a strong low-pressure system tracks through central Ontario, bringing heavy snow and gusty winds. **12th–15th:** Mild conditions for southern and eastern areas, with gusty winds and scattered snow squalls. Western Ontario may see brief

thaws. **16th–19th:** A deep freeze grips the province. Northern Ontario plunges into sub-zero temperatures, with clear skies and dangerous wind chills. Toronto is dry but frigid, while Lake Huron's eastern shore sees brief snow bands on the 18th. **20th–23rd:** Wet, cool southern Ontario, followed by gusty winds and blowing snow. Snow squalls and icy conditions, especially around the 22nd–23rd, for Eastern Ontario. **24th–27th:** A fast-moving Alberta Clipper sweeps through the province. **28th–31st:** Heavy snow eastern and southern Ontario, sharp cold snap.

### ALBERTA, MANITOBA, SASKATCHEWAN

**1st–3rd:** Brisk and blustery across the Prairies. southern Alberta sees gusty winds and light snow, while central Saskatchewan braces for bitter cold and drifting snow. **4th–7th:** Very cold conditions across the Prairies, with patchy flurries and overcast skies. **8th–11th:** Clear skies and calmer winds to southern Saskatchewan and Alberta, but by the 10th, a clipper system races across the Prairies. **12th–15th:** Milder temperatures southwestern Alberta, bring above-normal temperatures and melting snow to Calgary and the foothills. Central Manitoba sees snow squalls and gusty winds. **16th–19th:** Clear skies, cold temperatures throughout the region. **20th–23rd:** Wet snow and freezing drizzle southern Manitoba. Blowing snow Saskatchewan. Cold northern areas of Alberta. **24th–27th:** A fast-moving system brings windy, snowy conditions, followed by a brief thaw. **28th–31st:** Blizzard conditions sweep across southern Manitoba and southeastern Saskatchewan with heavy snow, whiteout conditions, and howling winds. Alberta's foothills see snow squalls and a sharp drop in temperature as Arctic air returns.

### BRITISH COLUMBIA

**1st–3rd:** Rain, chilly winds blow in to start the new year. Light snow possible in northern areas. **4th–7th:** Cool temperatures with some intermittent showers on the coastal regions. **8th–11th:** Heavy rain along coastal regions, wet snow in the higher elevations. **12th–15th:** A brief warming trend in southern areas, with milder temperatures and scattered showers. Light snow northern areas. **16th–19th:** A deep freeze returns, with clear skies and biting winds. **20th–23rd:** Heavy rain blows in from the coast. northern regions may see accumulating snow, especially on the 22nd–23rd. **24th–27th:** Winter wetness continues. Gusty winds and rain are predicted for southern areas, while significant snowfall is possible in the northern regions. **28th–31st:** A powerful Pacific storm slams into coastal BC, bringing torrential rain, high winds, and localized flooding. Interior areas will see heavy snow and whiteout conditions. A sharp cold front follows, plunging temperatures province-wide.

## FEBRUARY 2026 WEATHER FORECAST

### LABRADOR, NEWFOUNDLAND

**1st–3rd:** Strong winds and snow squalls western Newfoundland, while Labrador's coast braces for blizzard-like conditions. Inland areas remain bitterly cold. **4th–7th:** Cold, dry pattern sets in. Clear skies, cold for central Labrador. Brisk winds, light flurries eastern Newfoundland. **8th–11th:** Heavy snow and strong winds northern areas of the region. **12th–15th:** Moderating temperatures Western Newfoundland but quickly plunge by the 14th. Cold temperatures Labrador with patchy snow. **16th–19th:** Heavy precipitation and strong winds eastern Newfoundland, with coastal flooding possible. Wet snow and sleet for Labrador's south coast. **20th–23rd:** Cold and snowy for most northern regions with cold but drier conditions in the south. **24th–28th:** Snowy, stormy period with heavy snow, winds, eastern Newfoundland. Blizzard conditions possible in northern Labrador.

### NOVA SCOTIA, PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND, NEW BRUNSWICK, QUEBEC

**1st–3rd:** Heavy snow and gusty winds coastal Nova Scotia and eastern PEI. Blowing snow, cold temperatures for southern Quebec, including Montreal. Very snowy northern New Brunswick. **4th–7th:** A cold, dry pattern settles in for most of the region. **8th–11th:** Heavy snow, strong winds eastern Quebec and the Maritimes. Coastal flooding possible. **12th–15th:** A brief thaw moves through western New Brunswick and central PEI, followed by a sharp freeze. Northern Quebec remains locked in deep cold, patchy snow Nova Scotia. **16th–19th:** A new storm system brings heavy precipitation and strong winds to Nova Scotia's coast. Wet snow southern Quebec, cold and dry northern areas. **20th–23rd:** Persistent snow and freezing drizzle New Brunswick. Cool temperatures eastern Quebec. **24th–28th:** Heavy snow, high winds across Nova Scotia and PEI. Blizzard possible some areas of Quebec. Very cold northern New Brunswick.

### ONTARIO

**1st–3rd:** Heavy snow sweeps across southern Ontario. **4th–7th:** Clear but frigid period. **8th–11th:** Snow for Central Ontario. Wintry mix in Toronto, while eastern Ontario braces for gusty winds and blowing snow. **12th–15th:** A brief thaw southwestern Ontario, followed by a sharp freeze. northern Ontario remains cold and dry. **16th–19th:** Snow and strong winds for eastern and southern Ontario. Light snow but cold northern Ontario. **20th–23rd:** Persistent snow and freezing drizzle central and eastern Ontario. Cold and clam northwestern areas. **24th–28th:** Heavy snow, high winds in the north, while the south sees more cold temperatures than snow.

## FEBRUARY 2026 WEATHER FORECAST

### ALBERTA, MANITOBA, SASKATCHEWAN

**1st–3rd:** Bitterly cold in northern Alberta and central Saskatchewan. Light snow, brisk wind southern Manitoba. **4th–7th:** Sunny skies, milder temperatures southern Alberta. Cloudy, scattered flurries central Manitoba and eastern Saskatchewan. **8th–11th:** Snow and gusty winds southern Saskatchewan and southwestern Manitoba. Northern Alberta remains dry but cold. **12th–15th:** Milder air and scattered snow over Alberta. Central Saskatchewan sees a brief thaw, followed by a sharp freeze. Northern Manitoba remains locked in deep cold. **16th–19th:** Heavy snow for southern Manitoba. Snow squalls keep conditions white in eastern Alberta and central Saskatchewan. **20th–23rd:** Clear skies, frigid Alberta and Saskatchewan. Southern areas may see light snow accumulation. **24th–28th:** Powerful Alberta Clipper races across the region, bringing blizzard conditions to southern Saskatchewan and Manitoba.

### BRITISH COLUMBIA

**1st–3rd:** Heavy rain and gusty winds for coastal areas. Heavy snow possible in the mountains. **4th–7th:** Cool, dry air covers most of the province. Coastal showers linger but slowly clear. **8th–11th:** Widespread precipitation. Heavy rain along the southern coast, with wet snow in higher elevations. Accumulating snow possible. **12th–15th:** Above-normal temperatures and patchy sunshine areas. Northern regions remain cold and dry. **16th–19th:** Heavy snow blankets for the mountains, while coastal areas face wind-driven rain and localized flooding. **20th–23rd:** A cold front sweeps across the province bringing very cold temperatures in northern areas. **24th–28th:** A powerful Pacific storm barrels into the coast, bringing torrential rain, high winds, and possible power outages. Heavy snow possible for interior areas. A sharp cold snap follows in the wake of the storm.

A bed of soil cultivated for planting seeds or seedlings before being transplanted.




**FAVORABLE, GOOD + BEST**

to FREEZER

*Garden-fresh vegetables that will be added to casseroles or made into sauces later can be frozen for future convenience. While many recipes suggest blanching, which involves briefly boiling vegetables and then immediately cooling with ice water, the following fresh-from-the-garden vegetables can be frozen without this step.*



**CHERRY TOMATOES:** Wash and dry them thoroughly and freeze whole on a baking sheet. Once frozen solid, transfer to freezer bags. The skins might split during freezing, but they'll be perfect for cooking.

**Storage time:** Up to 6 months

**Best uses after thawing:** Toss them straight into pasta sauces, soups, or stews. The split skins actually help them break down faster while cooking.

**BELL PEPPERS:** Raw bell peppers are freezing superstars. Just slice them up, remove the seeds, and spread them onto a baking sheet. Pop them in the freezer for two hours (this keeps them from clumping together), then transfer to freezer bags. Remove as much air as possible before sealing them up.

**Storage time:** Up to 8 months

**Best uses after thawing:** Perfect for stir-fries, fajitas, and soups. They'll be softer than fresh, so don't plan on using them in salads.



**ONIONS:** Dice or slice them however you usually use them, freeze on a tray, then transfer to bags. Pro tip: Freeze in small portions so you can grab just what you need.

**Storage time:** Up to 8 months

**Best uses after thawing:** Perfect for cooking—toss them straight into the pan. They won't work raw in salads, but they're great in any cooked dish.

**ZUCCHINI:** Try grating your zucchini first, then freeze in measured portions (like one-cup amounts). Squeeze out excess moisture before freezing, spread on a tray, freeze, then bag it up.

**Storage time:** Up to 6 months

**Best uses after thawing:** Perfect for zucchini bread, muffins, or adding to soups. Drain off any excess liquid after thawing.

Astrologers associate the signs of the zodiac with specific parts of the body, believing that these signs have an effect on those parts. The dates listed on both sides are the Sun's place in each astrological sign.

This is not to be confused with the Moon's place in the zodiac, which is used for calculating our charts & calendars.

**ASTROLOGY** Astrology interprets the influence that the Sun and Moon have while they are in a specific zodiacal constellation, and is based on the concept that there are 12 signs of the zodiac, measuring 30° each, along the astrological circle.

Because the astrological placement doesn't take into account the precession of the equinoxes (the "wobble" that the Earth's axis experiences over a 26,000-year interval), the Moon's place according to astrology differs from its physical place according to astronomy. For your convenience, we provide charts of both the astrological and astronomical place of the Moon on the following pages.

**ASTRONOMY** Astronomy is the scientific interpretation of matter in space. The Moon can wander into a few astronomical constellations that are not members of the zodiac. These constellations include Auriga (AUR), Cetus (CET), Ophiuchus (OPH), Orion (ORI) and Sextans (SEX). You will see these abbreviations on the Moon's Astronomical Place chart.



**B=BEST:** Means that you will catch something almost every time you cast your line in the water.

**G=GOOD:** Means that you will catch enough fish that day to feel gratified.

**F=FAIR:** Means that you may catch one or two fish, but you will have to work hard to do so.


**P=POOR:** Means that the fish will either steal all of your bait or will not even touch your line.
